Welcome to a new month of "Voice" with a new format and a new logo! A few weeks ago, while attending the North American Christian convention, it struck me that we still needed a new logo. The one we have is ok, but we something simple, more

attractive, and is readily identified. It needs to speak to the core of who we are as a Church, which is the body of Christ.

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ." (1Co 12:12)

With that in mind, I began to consider the core of who we are, the functions that enable the body to function.

We were all called by Jesus to follow Him. "And Jesus said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you become fishers of men." "(Mar 1:17) Just as the disciples at Galilee, so we too respond in obedience and follow the one who called us.

Also, since we are the body of Christ, we are called to imitate the Lord, in our thoughts and actions. "Beloved, do not imitate evil but imitate good. Whoever does good is from God; whoever does evil has not seen God." (3Jn 1:11)

Also, since we are heirs of the Restoration Movement, founded by Thomas and Alexander Campbell, we work to restore the Church to its New Testament roots of Pentecost and piety. "'After this I will return, and I will rebuild the tent of David that has fallen; I will rebuild its ruins, and I will restore it," (Act 15:16)

Finally, who would we be if we did not serve the one who called us, both inside the body as officers and ministers, and outside the body, as missionaries and Jesus' hands and feet in the world? "Therefore they are before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple;

and he who sits on the throne will shelter them with his presence." (Rev 7:15)



Thus, with these ideas in mind, we of First Christian Church put Christ FIRST: following, imitating, restoring and serving under the cross of Christ. That is who we are. And then, suddenly, it all fit. And so, this is the logo I came up with:

#### **HOARDERS**

by Doug Harvey, Disciple Heritage Fellowship – July 2010 I am fascinated by the TV show, "Hoarders." It documents interventions in the lives of people whose homes have been overwhelmed by the accumulation of "stuff." One person has a house crammed wall-to-wall with clothes bought at garage sales. Another has 40-some cats living in a house crowded with clutter. The cats have shredded and soiled everything in the home. Another has accumulations of food trash rotting everywhere, but she can't let it go because it still might somehow be salvaged. All have been reduced to living in one or two minimal spaces while the rest of the house consists of paths through stuff piled high in every imaginable space.

When we watch "Hoarders," Bev and I often say, "How could someone live that way?" It just seems impossible. But hoarding is a surprisingly common problem. For one reason or another, people find themselves unable to part with things, and soon their whole lives are overtaken by stuff they are emotionally attached to, or I might need someday." It's disturbing to watch people in genuine agony over throwing out a broken ironing board or a can of corn with an expiration date of 2002

As an outsider looking in through the TV, I can say,

"Just let it go. In fact, just let it all go." But to the hoarders, the smallest decisions are gut-wrenching, even paralyzing. And the follow-up studies find most of the hoarders after having their living space restored and their house cleaned up, return to their old ways and within a year are completely buried in a new collection of stuff.

One of the core values of our movement is that of shedding the weight of "stuff that the church has accumulated over the centuries. We seek to get free from human traditions and historic divisions and just be simple, New Testament Christians. It's a great idea, but we often find it hard to let go of our "stuff." A recurring theme of the church in the last 25 years has been "worship wars" in which congregations tear themselves apart over the proper form and feel of Sunday morning's worship experience. If you go back to the New Testament, neither hymns nor choruses are commanded. Neither drums nor organs are advised. Quiet, reverent worship is not preferred nor is loud celebratory worship. No rules are posted about having services begin at I 1:00 or keeping the service to 60 minutes. Instead these debates hinges on our personal preferences. The real question we should be asking is, "What worship flow and musical style will best express the hearts of the people God has called us to target with the Gospel?"

Debate inevitably follows when someone suggests changing the format of Sunday School or moving our youth ministry to a cell-group model or holding a separate worship for those who worship best with a style we don't appreciate. God help the poor pastor who suggests that, instead of taking five minutes out of every service to talk about the offering and pass the plates through the congregation, the church experiment with a box at the back into which people can place their tithes and offerings.

As I watch the hoarders, I keep talking to the TV, saying, "Quit agonizing. Let it go. You don't need it. Keep what you really need, and let the rest go." If an unbiased outsider came to your church this week, would he shake his head at the "stuff' that is cluttering your church's life? Would he be discouraged to see what "stuff people would defend to the death of the church? Let's get serious about holding lightly to the things that are not eternal while holding tenaciously to those things that are lasting. Part of DIIF's ministry is to keep lifting up the things that are eternal so churches and church leaders can "keep the main thing the main thing." Your generous giving keeps this ministry strong. -DH
